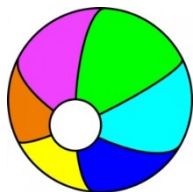

<b>3</b> Ask your child to review his last set of "heart words" every day until he is an expert.	<b>4</b> Sing the ♪ H-a-p-p-y song from <b>Sing, Sign, Spell, and Read!</b> by Nellie Edge.	<b>5 Cinco de Mayo</b> Sing Spanish songs: Hola Mis Amigos, De Colores, and Los Pollitos.	<b>6</b> Skip around the house singing, "Skip to My Lou."	<b>7</b> What do you notice about the weather? What is the temperature today?	<b>8</b> Go to the library and get some new books to read about your child's favorite wild animal.	<b>9</b> Sing, talk, and dance with your family every day.
<b>10 Mother's Day</b> Mom: Let your child serve breakfast in bed and tell you why she loves you so much.	<b>11</b> Draw pictures and write about what you want to do this summer as a family.	<b>12</b> Count backwards from 10 to 1. Count forward from 100.	<b>13</b> Count by 2's to 100. Count by 5's to 100.	<b>14</b> Ask your child about his favorite author. Tell him: You are a kindergarten author, too!	<b>15</b> Enjoy family dinner time together. Build family memories. (No electronics!)	<b>16 Armed Forces Day</b> Help your child make a card and write a letter to someone special.
<b>17</b> Fix a simple dinner of cheese, veggies, dip, and nuts. Sample something new.	<b>18</b> How many ways can your child combine objects to make 10 using his fingers or by drawing?	<b>19</b> Ask your child to talk about her favorite subject and why: "I like math because..."	<b>20</b> Sing family songs and favorite new school songs.	<b>21</b> Notice the clouds outside. <b>Be a meteorologist</b> and tell someone about the weather.	<b>22</b> Tell stories about grandparents. Talk about family memories.	<b>23</b> <b>Be an astronomer!</b> Take a night walk and look at the stars. Do you recognize any constellations?
<b>24</b> Make family dinner time a priority. <b>31</b> Say "please" and "thank you" all day.	<b>25 Memorial Day</b> Pick flowers for someone you love. Talk about Memorial Day.	<b>26</b> Watch your child fingerspell the new "heart words" and then write the entire set.	<b>27</b> Continue reading at least 20 minutes each night. Ask questions and talk about the stories.	<b>28</b> Sing the ♪ Summer Is Coming song...	<b>29</b> Sing and sign: ♪ Who? What? Where? When? Why? and How?	<b>30</b> Eat lunch outside and read a story together.

What is his favorite one and why?
<b>7</b> Sing and say the days of the week.	<b>8</b> Look for constellations. Count to 100 and beyond.	<b>9</b> Sing, Sign, and Spell: because, favorite, happy!	<b>10</b> Help your child practice saying and writing your address.	<b>11</b> Listen to your child count by 2's to 100. Count by 5's to 100.	<b>12</b> Reread favorite poems and songs in your child's "I Can Read" Notebook.	<b>13</b> Help your child write a bucket list of 10 things she wants to do this summer.
