Why Do Kindergartners and Their Parents LOVE Systematic Heart Word Study?



Use these sentence starters so students can begin writing "by heart."

Early in the year, the first 16 pink "heart words" allow kindergartners to write heart-connecting sentences such as "I love you." This is their first circle of writing mastery.

Daily "quick writes" of heart word sentences is the highest impact literacy strategy I can give teachers: it is how we **increase** "word power per minute" and build writing fluency and stamina.

Writing-to-read "heart words" include color-coordinated sets of 16 words each that give students writing **mastery with the sentences**: I love you. I see the... I like my... I can... I have a... Students move at their own rate. They challenge themselves to quickly learn each new set of words.

Writing and learning "heart word" sentences supports phonics work! Once the brain has learned to write a sentence starter with good handwriting, it has more memory space for vital phonics word work—to fearlessly encode sounds to print when writing new words! Writing sounds to make words is powerful phonics practice.

Learning "heart words" is one of the ways **we build engaged**, **motivated writers**. This strategy has proven successful in diverse Northwest classrooms. It allows us to integrate ABC Phonics Immersion, good handwriting, and sight word work, building stamina and confidence for writing workshop.

- The end goal is to be a "heart word" expert with at least 62 words and to fearlessly tackle any unknown word in their writing. (More proficient students may add additional sets of personal favorite words or the district's mandated first grade reading lists.) There is no ceiling on success-driven learning!
- Children and their families have a crystal-clear target of the 16 words they are currently working on and what the next target is.

2. We Provide Multisensory Teaching, and Make Learning Visible and Meaningful



- The word "love" is our anchor word. The "heart word" sentence "I love you" is practiced for mastery. ALL children need to see themselves as readers and writers of words that matter.
- A-Z high-frequency Word Wall is visible from front or side of the room.
- Children connect the high-frequency "heart words" "cat" and "dog" with the pages of their ABC Phonics: Sing, Sign, and Read! book.
- 3. We Use Fingerspelling to Help Children Develop Fluency with "Heart Words" and CVC Words



- We sing, sign, fingerspell, and write 33 pink and purple "heart words" and bonus words.
- We refer back to the key phonics symbol as needed to build the reading brain.
- Fingerspelling is connected to children's names and use of "Helper of the Day" strategy. A/"a" alligator and A/"a" Anna and...B/"b" bear and B/"b" Brian: your name starts with that same sound!
- 4. My Room Has A-Z Word Walls with Movable "Heart Word" Cards that Children Use!



- Children use these words during writer's workshop time. With limited space, a cookie sheet or an oil pan may become an additional movable Word Wall! The ABC Phonics book's images on our word wall are consistent.
- Challenge more proficient readers to reach for new targets.
- Teacher articulates lavender/purple word distinction.
- Small sets of color-specific "heart words" are made ahead, and there is a system for sending them home on a ring and/or in word boxes for family literacy.
- New color-specific words go up on the Word Wall AFTER they have been taught and while children observe. Newly taught words are reviewed.

5. We Involve Parents as Partners in Teaching High-Frequency "Heart Words"



- Each new set of "heart words" goes home on a ring in a special box for family review.
- "Heart Word"/fingerspelling cards are available for family practice and individual or collaborative use.
- "Heart word" I Can Read pages are included in student anthology notebooks.
- Teachers make copies of the Sing, Sign, Spell, and Read! CD for family listening (permission is granted).
- Parents are invited to help cut and create "heart word" props.



6. Ongoing Assessment Drives Instruction, and Learning Is Celebrated!



- Monthly on-demand writing and drawing assessments drive instruction.
- Consistent and engaging learning rituals and celebrations keep children motivated and focused (e.g. taking home their first "heart word" necklace or reading their "heart word" book).
- There is a visual acknowledgement (or celebration) for the child who masters the next "heart word" set. Each child soon has a photo on an award or in a **Hip Hip Hooray!** class book.

7. Our Students Use Music, Fingerspelling, Writing, and Sign Language to Create Memory Hooks



- They Sing, Sign, Spell, and Read! and practice accurate handwriting. (High-frequency "heart words" simultaneously accelerate reading and writing fluency!)
- Floor "heart word" posters are available for Read-to-Self and Read-to-Buddy times.
- Independent writing totes provide authentic writing activities with "heart words": "We Love Lists!" "Write a Message," and "Animal Rubber Band Books."
- 8. "I love you" Is Our "Heart Word" Anchor Sentence: We Read, Write, and Fingerspell the Words.



- We expect all children to master this sentence using accurate handwriting, spaces between words, and punctuation. Even special needs students can write "I love you" early in the year.
- Students Do "Quick Writes" of High-Frequency "Heart Word" Sentences Daily to Build Writing Muscle and Stamina for the Writing Workshop.
- 9. Independent Writing Totes Provide Systematic and Authentic "Heart Word" Practice



- Independent writing totes provide drawing and bookmaking experiences with a sequence of "heart word" sentences: "I love the...," "I see a...," "I like my...," "I can see...," "This is the..."
- 10. Learning Is Differentiated, and All Children Receive an Arts-Rich Talented and Gifted (TAG) Learning Model.



- There is constant challenge for the more-proficient readers and writers, and there is scaffolding for the developmentally-younger and less-experienced writers.
- As soon as a more proficient reader has mastered the first 62 words, additional organized sets of personally chosen words or first and second grade high-frequency words are added. These are systematically color coordinated in groups of 15-16 words.

11. "I Can Read" Anthology Pages Featuring "Heart Word" Songs and Chants Are Illustrated



- Children take pride in doing quality work and in challenging themselves to fingerspell, write, and read each new word.
- As new "heart words" are taught, they are added to the Word Wall, and old ones continue to be practiced and reviewed!
- 12. We Teach the Common Core Opinion Writing Word "because" Through Rhythm and Rhyme Early in the Year



- Children write compound sentences, e.g.: "I love my mom because she loves me."
- Later the word "favorite" is also memorized through a spelling and fingerspelling song. Children delight in writing about their favorite things!
- Harder-to-Accelerate Students Receive Additional Multisensory "Heart Word" Practice and Additional CVC (consonant-vowel-consonant) Brain Exercises for Fluency



- Response to Intervention (RTI) Teams or Kindergarten Intervention (KI) Teams of volunteers, parents, and 5th grade reading buddies provide additional targeted practice especially building fluency with pink "heart word" sentences and providing abc brain exercises for speed and accuracy.
- 14. Children Are Engaged in Authentic, Motivating Writing-to-Read Experiences throughout the Day and Across the Curriculum: It's How the Brain Learns Best!



- Early in the year children learn to draw animals and write "heart word" sentences in their own books.

Teach Students to Write "I love you."

Daily "Heart Word" Sentence <u>Quick Writes</u> with Good Handwriting Is a Powerful Strategy that Builds Circles of Writing Mastery!



It's the first month of school and kindergarten children are learning the joys of writing for real-world purposes. They are learning to write their first highfrequency "heart word" sentence: "I love you." With practice this becomes the first circle of writing mastery. Daily "quick writes" of "heart word" sentences is the highest-impact strategy I can give teachers: it is how we increase "word power per minute" (a.k.a. writing fluency and stamina)! This in turn frees the brain's working memory so it can do the vital work of building phonics skills: encoding sounds to print for new words.



Gradual-release-of-responsibility model

Students learn pink "heart words" using the Sing, Sing, Spell, and Read! strategies simultaneously taught with handwriting. In the photo, Katie Nelson teaches kindergartners to write a whole sentence using a gradual-release-of-responsibility model. Notice sky writing and use of white/erase boards.

"I love you" is a powerful anchor sentence for practicing efficient handwriting while nurturing Social Emotional skills.



We give children "I love you" writing models: a crystal-clear example of what good handwriting looks like. *Multisensory ABC and Phonic Immersion, Kindergarten-Friendly Handwriting* lessons, and "heart word" sentences dramatically increase writing fluency and stamina.

Make learning to write a meaningful, social and emotional experience. Invite children to take home and hide "secret messages."



We ask children to pause, think, and talk to their writing partner. Who says "I love you" to you? To whom do you say, "I love you"? Finally, they brainstorm where they could hide secret "I love you" messages...

I say, 'I love you' to my Mom... I could hide one in the refrigerator ...under the computer...in Dad's shoe...

I'll get up after my sister is asleep and put one in her room.

Kindergarten-friendly handwriting is part of a comprehensive writing program: It is practiced in a meaningful context.



This is what engaged writers look like. Sometimes the biggest challenge is that no one wants to stop and go out to recess! Notice the "I love you" writing models at the table. Writing-to-read "heart words" allow students to write heart connecting sentences so they care about writing.

Help children care about writing: Make writing real and provide support for success!



Younger children—especially boys—come to kindergarten with a wide range of fine motor development. Teachers provide multisensory experiences and individually coach children on efficient motions for letters within the context of real words. They have high expectations and give all children the scaffolding needed to build on success.

Children become engaged and purposeful writers.



I'm going to send this to my Grandma in Arizona, says one ambitious writer. Sometimes the engaged writers pause to decorate their messages.



How many 'I love you' messages will you write?

One boy decided to make 10 secret messages to hide all around his home. Another boy decided to write 20 secret messages and number them 1-20!

Writing Supports Reading Development and Reading Support Writing!

Kindergartners join the "book lovers club!" They read and reread favorite engaging books all year long. Notice all the opportunities to read "I love you" in well-loved children's literature.

Kindergarten literacy requires two kinds of books: *"read-all-the-words" phonics books AND books to "read-in-other-ways." (From **Shifting the Balance* by Jan Burkins and Kari Yates)



The books on this page are considered "read-in-other-ways" books which are designed to:

- Build oral language fluency
- Train the eyes left-to-right
- Reinforce concepts of print
- Nurture a love of reading
- Encourage family literacy



Good Kindergarten Writers Have Fluency with Two Kinds of Words:

- A growing collection of writing-to-read "heart words" We learn them "by heart." Heart word sentences become the first circles of writing mastery.
- 2. Words they spell phonetically, encoding sounds to print. Confidence with phonetic spelling allows students to fearlessly tackle any unknown word!

We systematically **teach both kinds of words** to build writing stamina and proficiency! Once students master "heart word" sentences, they have the memory space to apply phonics skills to tackle any new words.



Families Are Partners in Teaching Writing-To-Read "Heart Words"

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10 Reasons to Teach Fingerspelling in Kindergarten



1. Fingerspelling helps the brain remember letters, sounds, and words: It becomes the memory hook for ABC/Phonics and sight word mastery. Fingerspelling will enhance the effectiveness of any ABC/Phonics and word work program.

How did you teach your brain to fingerspell every letter in your name?



2. Fingerspelling develops fine motor dexterity for efficient pencil grip and handwriting proficiency.



3. For English language learners, fingerspelling provides an additional pathway to learning success with letters, sounds, and high-frequency "heart words." (Many English language learners master fingerspelling faster than their English-speaking classmates.)

Wow! You learned to sing, sign, fingerspell, and read another new word!



4. While teaching fingerspelling, thoughtful educators develop metacognition and a growth mindset: We teach children to focus, work hard, set goals, and think about their learning.

Look closely, keep practicing, and you can teach your brain to remember!



5. The strategies used to teach fingerspell are supported by decades of visual learning research. Teachers and children have crystal-clear, achievable learning targets. Teachers provide specific feedback, children learn to assess their progress, and mastery is acknowledged and celebrated! (Read John Hattie's book, *Visible Learning for Teachers*)



6. Fingerspelling provides additional support for children who are highly kinesthetic learners: All children are having the experience of learning a new language together while building stamina for writing workshop.



The more you practice, the better you get!

7. Learning to fingerspell provides a family literacy experience, multiplying our teaching effectiveness. Free online ASL video clips and abc support for at-home practice are available. Let parents know that fingerspelling not only builds hand-eye coordination for writing but also develops strength and dexterity for athletics and playing a musical instrument.

Parents as Partners multiplies our teaching effectiveness.



8. Fingerspelling teaches young children a new language. American Sign Language (ASL) is the third most commonly used language in the United States.

9. Learning to fingerspell builds children's pride in mastering a new communication skill. It teaches children to focus, observe closely, work hard, and develop visual motor integration.

You worked hard, and now you're an expert at fingerspelling every letter from A to Z. You must feel proud of becoming a master of fingerspelling!



10. Fluency with fingerspelling provides a memory hook to phonics during Writing Workshop while children are learning how to encode sounds to print.

When children fingerspell, it triggers the letter/sound memory. It also enhances the memory for high-frequency "heart words."

Growing Young Writers: I Am an Author Now! A simple "heart word" sentence model supports kindergartners in writing their own little book: 'I see the...'



Kindergartners love to draw animals and write their own little books. Meaningful word work activities involve making books using guided animal drawing pages, sentence writing models, pens, and writing materials stored in an Independent Writing Center Tote. In this lesson, students learn to draw a dog. They practice writing "My book," "by," "the end" and a sentence (I see the dog.) about their animal. As children build their writing stamina, additional pages may be added to the "Rubber Band Books." **This Is the Beginning of Bookmaking.** By the end of the year each child will write, edit, illustrate and publish an 8-page board book, building confidence and a love of writing!

Students Enjoy Writing When We Give Them Scaffolding to Build on Success



The experience of sitting in the Author's Chair and proudly sharing his work helps this young author see himself as an author and illustrator who does quality work.

The Final Piece of the Writing Process Is Sharing Your Writing and Receiving Feedback



While Zeke is reading his book, the children listen attentively. After he shares his last page with "the end," his teacher, Mrs. Corliss, provides feedback to the whole class:

- Notice he wrote "My Book," and "by Zeke," and he left spaces between words.
- Zeke decided to draw a picture of himself on his book cover.
- He wrote "the end" and fancied up the page by drawing—rocks!
- Thank you for sharing your book. We can tell you like to do quality work.
- Who has a compliment or question for Zeke?
- Okay, you can give Zeke applause for his book now.

What a Sense of Pride and Awe: Your words and pictures tell a story.



All smiles, Zeke then turns to teacher and says, "And I'm an author now!"

In kindergarten and at home, children will benefit from fluency writing practice with pink "heart word" sentences until the sentences are automatic. This builds writing stamina. We highlighted writing-to-read "heart words" that Athan and Kaley instantly knew. Notice—we had just introduced the Sing, Sign, Spell, and Read! word "favorite." Over 50% of the words these proficient writers used are high-frequency "heart words"!

This playful WOW Fingerspelling Salute is used to honor children in Katie Nelson's Kindergarten. After sharing a young author's book, she might invite the children, "Let's give him a Wow!"







Children practice "quick writes." This becomes a playful part of handwriting and phonics word work: If you know 'wow'—you also know how, now, cow, bow, and pow! Children soon create the house of "ow" using whiteboards.
